### **Emergency Cancellation**

The size of the Crystal City School District is 4.2984 square miles, making our district the eighth smallest in the state. With the superior job that the City of Crystal City does when clearing the streets during inclement weather it allows us to have school some days when other districts have to cancel.

In the case that the school has to cancel, all registered parents will be notified by text and email through our School Messenger subscription.

### **Federal Programs**

The federal programs are special funding sources for school districts. These funding sources have specific rules on their application in the instructional setting. Federal Title I.A, II.A, and IV.A provide a total of \$105,813.65 for instructional intervention support for students who struggle with aspects of reading and math. All of these funds are spent in the elementary and support the employment of the following professionals: Mrs. Annette Jacobs, Primary Reading Interventionist; Mrs. Hope Cooper, part time Reading Interventionist; and Mrs. Kim Weik, part time Mathematics Interventionist.

Crystal City Elementary utilizes a Response to Intervention (RtI) model whereby students' skills in reading and math are assessed periodically by norm referenced assessments. A norm referenced assessment is a quiz/test that is administered throughout the nation to students in a particular grade level. The results are compared to performance at our school, state, region, and nationally to ascertain how our students are performing relative to those groups. A student in the green (or on-grade level) performance category can be assumed to be on grade level at any school which utilizes the tests across the nation. Data teams of teachers convene and analyze these assessments along with other important factors like: classroom grades, discipline, social issues outside of school, etc. An intervention plan is developed for individual students and groups of students based on this very important planning.

# Athletic Passes for Senior Citizens

The Crystal City Board of Education will provide passes to the district's senior citizens, age 65 years and older. ### **Transportation**

## **Special Education Process**

The special education process is a data driven process set forth by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE). There are guidelines and procedures established to ensure compliance. Please find the list below of procedures and protocol for an initial special education referral.

- 1. A written or verbal referral is made to appropriate school personnel.
- 2. Within 1 to 5 days after the referral, the student's parent/guardian will receive a copy of Procedural Safeguards and Parent's Bill of Rights.
- 3. All appropriate data, school records, and information pertaining to the student referred will be reviewed. Parents will be notified with a determination of whether an evaluation is warranted.
  - 4. If an evaluation is warranted, parent/guardians may choose to give the school district permission to collect additional assessment data.
- 5. If permission to collect additional assessment data is given by the parents, the evaluation process begins and must be completed and eligibility determined within 60 calendar days.
- 6. If the student meets eligibility criteria to be classified as having an educational identification under IDEA, an IEP meeting will be scheduled. The IEP will be developed within 30 days following the determination that a disability exists.
  - 7. At the initial IEP meeting, parents may or may not sign a Notice of Action for placement consent and services. Special education services begin once the parent/guardian gives their consent.

# Care Team Information

The Care Team is a group of educators at the building level who assist classroom teachers with alternative instructional strategies for students who are displaying difficulties in the school setting. This group provides teachers with ongoing consultation and follow-up to ensure students are receiving beneficial interventions in the classroom. The team is a support system offering opportunities for problem solving and the development of implementation of techniques that will prevent unnecessary referrals to special education. The Care Team meets twice a month to discuss students who may need interventions in the classroom. Parents/guardians will be notified if their student(s) would benefit from the assistance of the Care Team.

The Junior High staff have years of experience in education and will offer your children with the structure they need to be quality learners as well as a sense of community they need to learn to function as young adults. All of our Junior High teachers also teach high school freshmen. This helps with transition to the high school level. Additionally, the school counselors team up to assist this age span.

Mrs. Stephanie Waites is the Elementary and Junior High Counselor and serves her students focusing primarily with emotional/social issues. Bullying and proper decision making is at the core of her job functions. Mrs. Shanna Meyer is the High School Counselor. Her job for the high school focuses on the same social/emotional development, but her job also concentrates on career choices. Mrs. Meyer works with Mrs. Waites in developing six year plans of study with the junior high students. In this way, Mrs. Meyer builds relationships with the junior high students. All of this is done to make student transitions into high school successful and with as little anxiety as possible.

#### 2018-2019 Missouri School Immunization Requirements

- All students must present documentation of up-to-date immunization status, including month, day, and year of each immunization before attending school.
- The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) allows a 4-day grace period. Students in all grade levels
  may receive immunizations up to four days before the due date.
- Required immunizations should be administered according to the current Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices Schedule, including all spacing, (<a href="http://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/schedules/index.html">http://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/schedules/index.html</a>).
- To remain in school, students "in progress" must have an Immunization In Progress form (Imm.P.14) on file. In
  progress means that a child has begun the vaccine series and has an appointment for the next dose. This
  appointment must be kept and an updated record provided to the school. If the appointment is not kept, the child is
  no longer in progress and is noncompliant. (i.e., Hep B vaccine series was started but the child is not yet eligible to
  receive the next dose in the series.)
- Religious (Imm.P.11A) and Medical (Imm.P.12) exemptions are allowed. The appropriate exemption card must be on file. Unimmunized children are subject to exclusion from school when outbreaks of vaccine-preventable diseases occur.

- Last dose on or after the fourth birthday and the last dose of pediatric pertussis before the seventh birthday.
   Maximum needed: six doses.
- 2. 8-12 Grades: Tdap, which contains pertussis vaccine, is required.
- 3. Grade 8-10: One dose of MCV is required. Dose must be given after 10 years of age.
  - Grade 12: Two doses of MCV are required unless the first dose was administered to a student who was 16 years of age or older, in which case only one dose is required. At least one dose must be given after 16 years of age.
- Kindergarten-8 Grade: Last dose must be administered on or after the fourth birthday. The interval between the next-to-last and last dose should be at least six months.
  - <u>9-12 Grades</u>: Last dose on or after the fourth birthday. Any combination of four doses of IPV and OPV constitutes a complete series. **Maximum needed**: four doses.
- 5. First dose must be given on or after twelve months of age.
- 6. There must be at least four weeks between dose one and two; at least 8 weeks between dose two and three; at least 16 weeks between doses one and three and final dose must be given no earlier than 24 weeks of age.
- 7. First dose must be given on or after twelve months of age.
  - <u>Kindergarten-8 Grade</u>: As satisfactory evidence of disease, a licensed health care provider may sign and place on file with the school a written statement documenting the month and year of previous varicella (chickenpox) disease.
  - 9-12 Grades: As satisfactory evidence of disease, a parent/guardian or MD or DO may sign and place on file with the school a written statement documenting the month and year of previous varicella (chickenpox) disease.
